African Nova Scotian Affairs (ANSA) is a vital link connecting our African Nova Scotian communities to government. The office works with provincial government departments and community organizations to champion the work to bring better solutions for people of African descent.

In my role as Associate Deputy Minister of ANSA, one of my priorities is to increase communication to make sure community members are well-informed about ANSA's role, what we are working on, and how we can serve the communities' needs. I see three key areas of focus for our work:

I am happy to say that ANSA is currently working on next steps to advance these key priorities, including recently announcing the expansion into three additional regions with offices in Digby (supporting Annapolis, Digby and Kings counties), New Glasgow (supporting Antigonish, Pictou and Guysborough), and the Preston area (supporting North Preston, East Preston Cherrybrook and Lake Loon). This is in addition to our regional offices in Sydney, Truro, Halifax, and Yarmouth, which will allow for enhanced supports for the African Nova Scotian communities they serve. Please stay tuned for more news and do not hesitate to reach out to ANSA at any time.

Wayn has been with ANSA since Day One, moving from what was then the Department of Education to help establish the new office in 2005. Under his guidance, ANSA has grown to include regional offices across Nova Scotia, with a reach that goes beyond provincial borders.

Wayn has excelled as a bridge-builder and connector: between ANSA and other departments; between government and community; between historic African Nova Scotian communities and newcomers; and between Nova Scotia and the broader African Diaspora.

New Regional Offices

New Regional Offices Increase Support for African Nova Scotian Communities

On January 17, the Province announced the establishment of new African Nova Scotian Affairs regional offices in Digby, New Glasgow, and the Preston area.

The three new regional offices will give African Nova Scotian communities across the province increased access to government support, programs, and services.

"We've heard loud and clear that rural African Nova Scotian communities have unique needs and concerns, and they need greater access to supports and services," said Pat Dunn, Minister of African Nova Scotian Affairs. "This is a step to make sure we're serving African Nova Scotian communities from one end of the province to the other."

The hiring process is underway to support the regional offices will begin soon, and the offices are expected to open in the coming weeks.

"Access is paramount if we are to strengthen our support to African Nova Scotian communities," said Dwayne Provo, Associate Deputy Minister of African Nova Scotian Affairs.

This year's African Heritage Month provincial theme, Through Our Eyes: The Voices of African Nova Scotians, recognizes the long-standing history of people of African Descent in the development of Canada. This theme explores and examines the effects of anti-Black racism and the voice of African Nova Scotians who blazed the trail for change. The theme also aligns with the United Nations' International Decade for People of African Descent (DPAD) 2015-2024. The goal of DPAD is to strengthen global cooperation in support of people of African descent, increase awareness, and the passage towards presence in all aspects of society.

Nova Scotia has over 50 historic African Nova Scotian communities with a long, deep, and complex history dating back hundreds of years. African Heritage Month provides us with another opportunity to celebrate our culture, legacy, achievements, and contributions of our people – past and present to the development of Nova Scotia society.

Each year, the African Heritage Month Information Network (AHMIN) produces an educational poster that is distributed and displayed in community gathering centers, schools, churches, government offices, and businesses. 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COVID-19 UPDATE



Covid-19 boosters are now available for youth 12 to 17 years old who:

- have an underlying medical condition that may put them at high risk of severe illness due to COVID-19, including those who are immunocompromised and who have already received a threedose primary series (for adolescents who are immunocompromised, a booster dose would be their fourth dose)
- are residents of congregate living settings, including shelters, group homes, quarters for migrant workers and correctional facilities
- belong to racialized or marginalized communities disproportionately affected by COVID-19.

NOVA SCOTIA REOPENING PLAN

Nova Scotia is moving up the timeline for easing public health restrictions. Starting Monday, February 28, Phase 1 of the Province's reopening plan will be adjusted to end the current requirement to show proof of full vaccination before participating in non-essential, discretionary events and activities. Other Phase 1 restrictions continue.



Phase 2 will start March 7. capacity limits and gathering limits will increase. p Masks and distancing are still required in Phase 2. All public health restrictions outside the health care system will end when Phase 3 starts on March 21, including the need for masks and distancing. Some restrictions may continue in high-risk settings.

A Look Back

CAPE BRETON REGION

Year two of the pandemic has left our African Nova Scotian community groups pivoting to keep the community spirit alive. This roller-coaster that we are all on is very challenging and at times tests our patience. Our communities are left feeling exhausted, overworked and definitely over-volunteered. But at the end of every rainstorm there is a rainbow. Our groups in Cape Breton will keep on abiding by all guidelines and restrictions for the betterment of their communities.

In August 2021, in Cape Breton we held the first annual Emancipation Day Celebration at the Fortress of Louisbourg. This was a great first annual event with a great community turnout. Many thanks to the Fortress for their partnership and leadership. Our African Nova Scotian youth were there in full participation, and we are looking forward to planning the 2nd annual Emancipation Day in August 2022.

The Association of Black Social Workers (ABSW) held Covid-19 vaccination clinics in two of our communities in June 2021. Glace Bay UNIA Hall in the community of Glace Bay and the Menelik Hall in the community of Whitney Pier were able to recruit volunteers and both clinics were very successful and had a great turnout from our African Nova Scotian communities. In late December, ABSW brought back the vaccination clinic to Whitney Pier - Menelik Hall and again there was a lot of interest for our African Nova Scotian community members who, if eligible, were able to receive 1st and 2nd doses as well as boosters.



This latest wave of the Covid-19 pandemic has left planning for African Heritage Month 2022 a challenge to say the least. After several changes, we realized community is always the most important. Each African Heritage Month, our communication and messaging is always the same, we let it be known that African Heritage should not be celebrated just one short month out of the year but it should be celebrated daily. Well, 2022 will put that to the test. This year's African Heritage Month Gala and Opening Proclamation will be rescheduled to May 20-21, 2022. The African Heritage Month Proclamation will take place on Friday, May 20 at noon at Centre 200 (481 George Street) and is open to everyone. The 14th African Heritage Month Gala will take place on Saturday, May 21 at Membertou Trade & Convention Centre; this event is sold out. We are hoping these celebrations will give our communities something to look forward to. And when it is safe to do so we will 'Celebrate Being Together Again.'

SOUTHERN REGION

2021–2022 Public Engagement on Derogatory Names in Shelburne County

Historical Background:

The public engagement team consulted with more than 200 participants in the summer of 2021 to find new names for four locations in the Barrington and Shelburne areas. The current names are perceived to be derogatory in nature and need to be changed.

The process started with Geographical Information Services receiving two similar applications from citizens in 2016 and 2018 requesting a change of derogatory names in Shelburne and Barrington Districts including Cape Negro (community), Cape Negro Island, Cape Negro (cape on the island), and Negro Harbour.

Subsequently, a meeting was held with Shelburne and Barrington District Municipalities, the Black Loyalist Heritage Society, Communications Nova Scotia, African Nova Scotian Affairs and others, and public engagement was held from June 7 to July 23. The primary focus was to create awareness of the initiative and to seek new place names from Shelburne County residents and other key stakeholders through mail, online, or by phone. We encouraged names that reflect African Nova Scotian heritage and culture. Ultimately, the name changing process will result in new place names, mailing addresses and civic address changes.

Where we are today:

Suggestions for new names reflecting our African Nova Scotia heritage were received and researched, and a short-list was created for residents to participate in the final selection in November. In the beginning of December, a letter and survey were mailed to the residents in Shelburne County and we will accept name suggestions until the end of February. The plan is to have all suggested names reviewed by early March and for the new chosen names to be announced by the end of March.

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Transit Association of Guysborough (TAG): A New Community Transit Service Helping the African Nova Scotian Community in Guysborough

The Transit Association of Guysborough (TAG) is finally up and on the roads for residents in Guysborough County. Although consultations and talks with the Rural Transportation Association, African Nova Scotian Affairs, the NS Department of Business and community organizations and residents of Guysborough began in 2019, conversations about a transit service in Guysborough County has been in the works for more than a decade. Through a lot of hard work, dedication, and collaboration with the volunteers all having the same vision, TAG is up and providing transportation for residents in Guysborough County, especially for members of the African Nova Scotian Community.

TAG is a non-profit, community-based public transit provider serving communities of Guysborough, the Town of Mulgrave, Canso, and surrounding areas. TAG's mission is to improve the quality of life for residents by providing dependable, affordable, and inclusive community-based transportation through our door-to-door and book a ride service. TAG is made possible with funding support from the Government of Nova Scotia Department of Public Works. TAG is also the twentieth organization to join the Rural Transportation Association throughout the province of Nova Scotia.

This option will have a driver come to your door, pick you up and take you where you need to go, whether it be an appointment, a shopping trip, or just a social outing. TAG currently operates two vehicles: a Toyota Sienna Hybrid and a Dodge Caravan being adapted for wheelchair accessibility.

It was a great opportunity for the public to meet our drivers, Executive Director and Board members to ask questions about our services. Municipal Councillor Mary Desmond, who represents the African Nova Scotian communities of Lincolnville, Sunnyville, Upper Big Tracadie, mentioned "For many years, members of the African Nova Scotia community have been deprived of activities and events due to the lack of transportation. This is a great day for all citizens of the Municipality of the District of Guysborough and the Transit Association of Guysborough." Desmond called on all community members to support the service. There will be upcoming launches for the African Nova Scotian communities sometime in 2022.

Suicide Prevention Framework Campaign

We want to hear from you!

The Government of Nova Scotia launched an online survey to hear from a broad and diverse range of Nova Scotians on the topic of mental health and help-seeking. If you reside in Nova Scotia and are 18 years of age or older, you are welcome to take this survey. Responses are anonymous and will be used to inform the actions under the Suicide Prevention and Risk Reduction (SPRR) Framework. The SPRR Framework guides partners with 20 recommendations over six areas of action and holds health equity as a foundational principle.



As you know, January 26 was 2022 Bell Lets Talk Day, and this year's campaign has a heartfelt message about reaching out for help. This is not always easy for some to do for a variety of reasons; there can be many barriers that stop someone from seeking help when they need it. Understanding how and why people seek help is important to reducing stigma and providing the right supports.
